Disclaimers

Assembly of this chart was not an exact science. In several instances, the developing chart was modified to incorporate new/different information or to discount information that I had later judged to be unreliable. I have made a diligent and reasonable effort to ensure accuracy by evaluating reliability of independent sources (many errors are simply propagated by the cut-and-paste scholarship too often encountered). Please, if you have a serious interest in this information, conduct your own research. I would particularly regret introduction of new errors, and thus ask that I be kindly notified so that I may make corrections; there are enough without my additions.

In an effort to keep this chart manageable, I have made it “bare-bones.” The focus of the chart, as the name implies, is **Shared Ancestry**, and if a person—even an important person to me, such as my mother’s sister, Lucille (1920-1984)—did not contribute to this theme, that person is not included. (Specifically, in the case of Lucille, her spouse, Jack Poole (1922-1984), did not share ancestors to my knowledge with other family members.) Many other family connections, those not involving blood lines, have also been omitted from the chart. As one example, an older sister, Mary, of my 2d great grandfather James I. Fountain (in chart), married Billie Wa(l)ters and their daughter Missouri (aka Mazura) was the widow of Jonathan N. Knight (son of Aaron, in chart) and later became the 2d wife of my 3d great grandfather John Ellis Connell. (This John E. Connell is not to be confused with John E(noch) Connell or John E. McConnell, both of whom lived in Berrien at the same time.) As a second example, Rosanna Porter (m. William B. Rowan), in chart, was the widow of Richmond Mullis, the brother of my 2d great grandmother Fairby Mullis Sutton (in chart). As a third example, the marriage of Jerry W. Sutton (son of Moses G, in chart) to Martha Watson (paternal aunt of Mark A., in chart) is not included, nor is the marriage of Mary Watson (paternal aunt of Mark A., in chart) to William Jasper Rowan (son of William B, in chart). . . . and so on. Bare-bones, as mentioned.

The black (usually horizontal lines) are relevant marriage bonds whereas the narrower blue lines are ones of descent. The vertical axis is approx. years, from ~1780 at top to ~1930 at bottom. The vertical position was “plotted” by husband’s year of birth, and then license was taken in vertical adjustments to make the fit the data. (iow, small differences in the vertical are not important.)

For sake of brevity, I have listed only one authority for each category though for many, if not most, I have several authorities. As an extreme example, I know when my father died because I was there, I have his death certificate, his obituary, have visited his grave marker, and my mother and I always reminisced about him each year on the date of his death. On the other hand, sometimes the authority I used does not cover the complete entry. For example, Aunt Bessie identified and shared photographs of her Robinson grandparents, but in that interview, I failed to record their full names, which were obtained elsewhere. In general, I have used primary sources that I have confidence in, particularly those that are easily accessible (e.g., a gravemarker) instead of derived sources, particularly those without documentation and unavailable to the general public (e.g., a member tree on Ancestry.com, which has a paywall). Of course, there's always some degree of uncertainty—as an example, I do not know, despite my efforts, whether my grandfather spelled his name Lucious or Lucius. In some uncritical cases such as an unused first name, I have not listed an authority (such as a wedding announcement).

3. The format is County ST. I have intended to use the county name at the time of the birth or death, not the present-day county name (I readily admit, though, ignorance in how counties were formed outside South Georgia). A particular location might have been in different counties over the years. For example, a location could have been in the original Irwin, then cut out into Lowndes and subsequently be placed in Berrien, when that county was formed. This reorganization of counties, of course, introduces confusion, but using a standardized system at least makes an entry traceable.

This link also has photos of her mother and father, Reverend and Mrs. William David Robinson, and of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Melton Robinson. Please note that I have used the spellings in the Robinson Roundup, not the spellings I obtained from Aunt Bessie.

6. *PWG7:99* in the vignette for Ethel(d)red Fountain incorrectly states that his daughter Nancy (Carolina) married David M. Fountain, who was in fact her son. In the vignette on William E. Fountain, *PWG3,99*, the middle initial is correctly stated as “S.” It also gives Nancy’s birth as 1830 whereas RR gives it as 1831, not a substantive difference.

7. When she married Aaron Knight, she was a widow of Merritt A Sanders (*PWG7, 556*). In the 1860 FC, they had a combined family of his children, incl. George W., from his first marriage, and Sanders children from her first marriage.

8. She is also shown as Elendar and Elenor in some sources. (Both these spellings were used more than once, so, not a typo.)

9. I accepted Phoebe as it was used instead of Frances in the vignette on Moses G. Sutton (Jr.), *PWG4, 291*.

10. Pillie Webb was the first wife of Alexander C. Outlaw (1804-1891), they together being the parents of my greatgrandfather, W.H. H. Outlaw. Alexander’s lineage can be traced back to the mid1600s in Virginia (Mrs. John Bennett Boddie, ed (Historical Southern Families XVI, Genealogical Publishing Co, Baltimore, 1971). When I began this chart, I was under the impression—incorrect as it turned out—that Pillie Webb was the daughter of Dawson and Frances Webb, the ancestors of many Berrien Countians.. I don’t recall why I believed that, but it certainly did fit with my greatgrandfather, W.H.H. Outlaw, being a member of the Dawson Webb family in the 1850 FC (which was the first to list names). As a beginning point, I primarily relied on *PWG7, 449* and [Jimmie L. Webb’s 1998 post](#) (accessed 2013-04-07) for information re Dawson Webb and his family. Mostly, the children listed by *PWG* and Webb match, except *PWG* has an additional child, last being born in 1842, named Mary F. and reported to have married W.H. Outlaw. This is incorrect. W.H.H. Outlaw was born in 1840 and married Mary F. Carroll.

I have used Mr. Webb’s death date for Dawson Webb (*PWG* put it in the 1860s) in the table and merely note that this Dawson Webb was alleged to have died as early as 1854 and as late as 1869 according to other sources. I found neither Dawson nor Frances in the 1860 Federal Census (in Berrien, Clinch, or Lowndes), but, of course, absence of evidence is not compelling. In [one index](#), only two Webbs, John and Mary, were living in Berrien County in 1860. This John was of the age of Dawson’s son John, who had married Mary Futch in 1859, and was likely him.)

(Incidentally, Boddie does not list William H. H. Outlaw as one of the children of Alexander, but she cites a manuscript listing Alexander and his sons, including William H. (H.) Outlaw. This history, along with oral family history indicating that W.H.H.’s father was ‘[Old Alec from Alabama](#)’ and much more information establishes the relationship. This history is also consistent with W.H.H. Outlaw’s reporting on the FC (1860-1910) his birthplace as Alabama. (Thus, the 1850 FC (Lowndes), when W.H.H. was merely 10, is spurious, apparently in error concerning his birthplace. As one infers, *PWG* is also incorrect about Dawson Webb’s family’s enumeration in Wilkinson County in 1850, as are passages elsewhere describing his migration with other families to Berrien County in the 1850s. Probably, the Dawson Webb family moved to Berrien some time after Mar 31, 1844, the day that daughter [Frances married William](#) Fountain in Wilkerson GA, but before the 1850 FC.)

To examine the feasibility that Pillie Webb was the daughter of Dawson and Frances Webb, I have first tried to determine the life years of Pillie Webb and second determine whether she shows up in the Dawson Webb family. In the 1840 Federal Census (Dale AL), Alex Outlaw (mistranscribed as “Alecd”), then age 36, is shown as the head of a household including a female 20-29 yo, presumably Pillie, placing her dob=1811-1820. If we assume that Pillie was at least 16 when her first child, Jeremiah Outlaw, was born, the dob can be narrowed to 1811-1817. Cato and Mama (Descendency Chart of Alexander Outlaw and Pillie Webb, unpublished) apparently had her dob too early. (Mr. Cato’s birthname was Outlaw, but it was changed when his stepfather adopted him.) I estimated limits of Pillie’s death as after the birth of her last child and a year before the birth of Alexander’s first child (viz. Letitia or Lydia Outlaw) by his second wife, Naomi Bess

Fortunately, the census records (below) mesh with the known age structure of the Dawson Webb family in 1820 with regard to all members. Had Pillie been enumerated, there would have been four young girls, not three as shown. The 1830s FC (Family No. 337) is also missing Pillie (& has extra children). The simplest conclusion is that Pillie Webb was not the daughter of Dawson Webb.

The connection between the Dawson Webb family of Berrien County and the Alexander Outlaw family of Dale County (AL) is undeniable. In a 1993 letter (to Brenda Jasper), Mama indicated that Pillie was Dawson’s sibling; that is plausible and I have accepted it for the chart, but I do not know her source of information. The 1820 FC (Wilkinson, GA) shows several Webb families, but only one has the age structure to be Dawson’s parents (1 or 2 living with age>50 yo). That family (“Etheldreda” Webb, according to the transcript, but the original is very difficult to read) had two daughters of Pillie’s age. According to Boddie, James Outlaw (Alexander’s father) and family moved to Wilkinson Georgia near 1820, but too late for inclusion in the census. At

the expense of redundancy, the James Outlaw family and the Dawson Webb family lived in Wilkinson Georgia as Alexander was becoming a young man of marriageable age. Because it bears tangentially on the issue, I note that Alexander was enumerated (1840 FC Dale AL) immediately after James Outlaw (mistranscribed as “Jas Antlane” on Ancestry.com), age 60-69, whose household included a 60-69 yo woman, Alexander’s stepmother.

11. As mentioned in Footnote 10, only two Webbs were enumerated in Berrien County in 1860. The head of the house apparently is Dawson’s son John. This family was enumerated 440 whereas my greatgrandfather W.H.H. Outlaw was enumerated in a Brogdon family, 442. In the 1850 Federal Census, as Family 620 in Lowndes County, Georgia, Dawson Webb self-reported as having been born abt 1787 in NC. His spouse, Frances, self-reported as having been born abt 1794 in Georgia. Other members of the household were Nancy Webb (f), b. abt 1823; Jane Webb (f) b. abt 1828; Jordon Webb (m) b. abt 1830; John Webb (m) b. abt 1832; Martha Webb (f) b. abt 1837, and Wm.H. H. Outlaw (m) b. abt 1840.

13. According to notes of Carolyn C. Outlaw, undated. I do not know the source of her information, and note that this page of notes has several errors.

14. On page 4 of the 1820 FC, Etheldred (nb spelling) Fountain was enumerated on Aug 07 in Jefferson (Burke) County, GA. His family consisted of himself and spouse, plus 2 boys under 10 yo (presumably, James Isaac and William) and a girl also under 10 (presumably, Mary). In addition, I note to regret, the record shows that he owned 2 slaves; not sure how it could come to be that the son of a Revolutionary Soldier, here, John Fountain who would give his life for freedom, would become a slave owner.

15. I’ve used the middle initial A, following a family tree on Ancestry.com (<http://trees.ancestry.com/tree/35869164/person/18848758363> accessed 2013-05-01). This is the Aaron Knight who was the son of William Anderson Knight and brother of General Levi Jefferson Knight, who raised “Berrien County Minute Men” in the war. (There was apparently another and later Aaron A. Knight (son of John W., b abt 1857) in Berrien County, as there was another Levi J. Knight, b. ~1833, son of John). Aaron might seem to be overshadowed by his brother Levi Jefferson, but Aaron himself was a man of substance, too, being an officer in the militia. The movement of the Knights to present-day Berrien is revealed in a recent interesting blog (<http://raycityhistory.wordpress.com/?s=knight> accessed 2013-05-07).

18. Presumptive, *PWG1*, 198 indicates that Fairby’s father, Blackstone Mullis (1800-1863), was born near Raleigh and moved his family to Georgia (then Pulaski, now Dodge County) about 1840. I found him enumerated in Anson County—quite south of Raleigh—in 1820. For 1830, I did not find him but found several Mullis families (incl Joel, putatively his nephew), as well as names possibly Mullis that were mistranscribed (Muller, Mallis) when I manually

searched every Anson record. For FC 1840, Pulaski Co, GA, I did find a B. Mullis whose age and spouse's age fit, and within a couple of years, the other household members fit too. I concluded that he was already in Pulaski by 1840.

Feraby Sutton self reports 1870 FC that she was born in NC, and I did find a member tree on Ancestry.com that put her birth in Wake County (Raleigh) w/o documentation, where I found a number of Austins (surname of Fairby's mother, Mary). Most of the member trees dealing with Blackston(e) Mullis were obviously wrong in several ways. Of the trees that I examined, the LCarter 1025 seemed the most carefully done (cited above). See <http://trees.ancestry.com/tree/14368672/person/96963611> accessed 2013-05-01. In the 1870 FC, she reports an incorrect age for herself and at least one of her children? (PWG1, 198 is mistaken in noting that Fairby's older brother's widow married William J. Rowan, should read: William B. Rowan).

I searched all I was willing to, and never found him in 1830, so presently, I can't say for sure where Fairby Mullis within NC was born.

19. Stephen Lewis is shown in the 1860 FC at 5 yo in Berrien County, in his father's household. (N.B. ~the lower half of Berrien—about from Rowetown Church southward—was in Lowndes County before Berrien was formed in 1856.) Stephen's father, John G., was still in John G.'s parents' household in 1850 in Wilkinson GA. Several ancestry.com trees put without documentation Stephen Milton's birth in Berrien Co., which is consistent with what I find, but not proof for it. At least if SM Lewis were not born in Berrien, he still would not remember anything but Berrien. NB, there was another Stephen Lewis, b. abt 1840, who lived in Berrien County, not to be confused. This latter Stephen Lewis was a 20 yo laborer for Gideon Gaskins in the 1860 FC, and might have been J. Stephen.

20. I think this is the way he spelled his name, but I can't be sure that it wasn't Ansel, a typical spelling for that era.

21. Mark A. Watson's father, Samuel W. Watson, was widowed in 1894 while he lived in Berrien County. By the 1900 FC, Samuel W. Watson had moved to Irwin County with his first two children (by Martha Guthrie, d/o Samuel), and had married Elizabeth Boykin (d/o John D.), Mark A.'s mother. In 1900, the S.W. Watson family lived next to Reason Boykin, Elizabeth's brother, in Irwin County, and owned a farm outright. Not sure right now where Mark was born, but over the years, I'll keep my eyes open. . . . probably Irwin? (btw, most of the dates on the referenced FC are incorrect—see <http://www.southernmatters.com/image-database/display-selected.php?id=656>.)

22. Irrelevant, but as a matter of interest, my working hypothesis is that Lamar Fountain, the escape artist of Ray City, GA), was the greatgrandson of W.E. and Frances Webb Fountain. He might be the most newsworthy of all Ray City citizens (Google, The Ballad of Lamar Fountain).

23. In addition to the Rowan descendants, he had two other sons, surname Hunter, (PWG7,201) who remained in Clinch GA after the William B. Rowan family moved to Berrien GA in 1874 (PWG3,286).

24. McM indicates that Fairby Mullis Sutton and Newton Sutton had 5 children and that Fairby and the children were enumerated in the 1870 FC in Berrien County (Newton died in the war). I cannot confirm that statement. She was enumerated in 1870 as Family 697 (near her father-in-law, as 693) with three children, viz. Polly (in chart), Jerry S. (as Jeremiah, in chart) and Sarah. These are the three children known to me by oral history. In the 1880 census, she

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is enumerated with two other household members, Jeremiah and Sarah, as expected. (Polly had married S. M. Lewis in 1875, Jessie H. Paulk, *Berrien County Georgia Marriage Records Index 1856-1949*.) Again, she was enumerated near her deceased husband's families.
